Page 3/4	Route of administration: "external use" is not defined in the current Standard terms list (December 2004) nor in the ICH M5 EWG "Routes of administration controlled vocabulary" The appropriate term should be "topical use" as expressed in the ICH M5 draft, even if in the 2004/24/EC Directive on traditional herbal medicinal products (article 16 bis §1.c) "external use" is used but not defined. Topical medicinal products are defined in the CPMP guideline "Excipients in the label and package leaflet of medicinal products for human use" (CPMP/463/00. July 2003) § Excipients in the labelling:	Decision that the document should retain reference to "external use" as referred to in Directive 2001/83/EC as amended.
	"Topical medicinal products can be taken to include those medicinal products applied externally to the skin, respiratory products delivered to the lung by inhalation and any medicinal product delivered to the oral, nasal, rectal and vaginal mucosae, i.e where the delivery may be local or transdermal." Using the "topical use" expression avoids a comprehensive Routes of administration list i.e encompassing the auricular, buccal, cutaneous, dental, nasal, oral, oropharyngeal, rectal, inhalational, sublingual, gingival, laryngeal, laryngopharyngeal, oromucosal routes (14 routes). Most of these routes are used by current herbal drug preparations through the European Community.	

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
